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A . Executive Summary

B.P. Sulakhe Commerce College is one of the branches of Shri Shivaji Shikshan Prasark Mandal Barshi, founded by Late Karmveer Dr. Mamasahab Jagdale and had developed it since 1934. Mamasahab devoted his entire life selflessly for the development of this Mandal which consequently reflects its light on the drought-prone area of Solapur and Osmanabad districts in the Western Maharashtra. Due to the working of this Mandal, thousands of students not only got educated but also morally built up by the philosophy of Mamasahab as, “Simple living and high thinking”, “Work is worship” etc. By observing his sincere, fully devoted, entirely selfless work for the upliftment of under privileged classes, many institutions, organizations honored him by offering various awards. At present management runs 5 Primary Schools, 14 Secondary schools, 5 vocational course centers, 2 Agricultural schools, 5 senior colleges, 3 Training colleges, one printing press and one hospital. A well-known industrialist late Bhagwantrao Pandharinath Sulakhe, donated fifty thousand rupees generously by observing the sincere efforts of Dr.Mamasahab Jagdale. To honor his assistance Mamasahab started separate Commerce College and named it as B.P. Sulakhe Commerce College. This is a single faculty Commerce college. This may be only one separate commerce college at taluka level in the jurisdiction of Solapur University. The main aim of the college is to impart commerce and computer education to develop skills, to provide opportunities of integrity, innovation & excellence to the students. At present the college runs junior commerce, junior arts, vocational courses, senior commerce (B.Com.), senior computer applications, (BCA),PGDCA, M.Com., M.Phil. in Commerce & Management and Ph.D. in Commerce, Management and Ph.D in Business Economics- In 2004 NAAC have accredited our college at C⁺⁺ level. Since then our college has started its progress in all ways, i.e. student strength, infrastructure facilities, results, availability of teaching aids, starting of research Centers etc. Below we discuss some points criterion wise -



1) Curricular Aspects :

Our college is affiliated to Solapur University, Solapur. We follow the curricula designed by the University. Semester system has been adopted by the institution. Out of 10 fulltime teachers 7 i.e. 70% teachers have played a vital role in designing the curricula of university. The college is running M.Com. BCA., PGDCA, as self financed courses. M.Phil. in Commerce and Management run by our college is the only one recognized M.Phil. Center in the Solapur University. The college started two research centers, one for Commerce and Management and other for Business Economics for Ph.D. study. Feedbacks regarding the curricula from the stake holders are collected. They are discussed and they are passed to the University for further consideration. The institution provides necessary funds to upgrade & purchase equipments, library books, which supplement the curriculum to meet the goal, & objectives. Faculty attended workshops, training programs, seminars etc. addressed on change of curriculum. The college gives flexibility & mobility by offering two optionals at B.Com Part I viz 1) Insurance & Tourism 2) Business Mathematics & 3 options at B.Com. Part III viz 1) Adv. A/c 2) Adv. Statistics & 3) Industrial Management, The college runs also, "Yeshawantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University Study Centre (YCMOU) through which B.A., B.Com., M.B.A., D.S.M., B.Lib, M.A. (Marathi), Preparatory etc 7 programs are run. In past we were also running M.Phil. courses in English, Marathi, Economics, Commerce etc. recognized by YCMOU. Due to the local demand we introduced M.A. (Marathi) open university course from 2011.

2. Teaching Learning and Evaluation :

Admission process is transparent in our college. The college gives publicity regarding admission process through prospectus, advertisement, notice board & through mouth publicity of alumina. For BCA course admissions are given by the University Admission Committee is formed. The Principal is the chairman of this committee. Admission committee provides detail information to the stake holder's regarding reservations, scholarships, optional subjects, fees, facilities available in the college. prizes, etc. The college organizes, one day orientation program for fresh batch students in which facilities of university educations, examination pattern, nature of questions papers, evaluation process, facilities available in the college, codes of conducts are explained. Students are counselled for regulatory. Teachers submit their annual semester wise teaching plans. They are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. Students are encouraged to participate in seminars, quiz, group discussion, project writing etc. Slow learners and advanced learner are identified by the faculty and they are facilitated accordingly. Speeches are arranged on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. Students of B.Com. Part II are encouraged to appear to Aptitude Test in statistics organized by SUSTA, Kolhapur every year. They are prepared for it. Many students appear for it, Dalavi Jaydeep secured IInd rank in it & he was feliciated at Kolhapur For B.Com./M.Com. programs. The University takes the final examination & carry evaluation. No internal credit is there. However some teachers conduct unit tests, provide questions bank, ask to write Home Assessment etc.



The College conducts pre-semesters examination internally. For BCA & PGDCA courses there is 20% weightage for internal assessment of term test, participation in seminars, group discussions, home work, attendance etc. M.Com. PGDCA & BCA III students have to develop a project work. There will be viva-voce on the project work. Due to that there is a continuous teaching learning process. In teaching process the college faculty uses ceramic chalk boards, marker boards, LCD,OHP, Home Theaters, clarity pro-sound amplifier, clarity Mi-Board Film/chips, shows etc. Internet facilities are provided for faculty & students. In campus as well as in classrooms CC TV cameras have watch on the movements of students. So the energy of students is not wasted in nuisance. All permanent teachers are well qualified. Out of these 2 are Ph.D. and also recognized guides of home university as well as some other universities also. To update the teachers' quality they are encouraged & facilitated to participate in seminars, workshops, conferences etc. 20% faculty are invited as resource persons by other agencies, 96% of faculty participated in conferences, seminars etc. & presented their papers there. 70% faculty engaged with paper setting and assessment work in the university. Results of our college are higher than the university results. Shri. Jaydeep Dalavi stood first in university at B.Com. Degree examination in 2012. He was awarded with university prize as well as college prize. To develop the competitions in learning process the college has declared four prizes for the best students.

3. Research Consultancy and Extension :

The college started two research centers which are well equipped and recognized by Solapur University, Solapur. One in Commerce and Management and other in Business Economics. The college runs M.Phil. and Ph.D programs. We are proud of our college & M.Phil centers that is the only one center in the area of Solapur University. So many students outside of the Barshi also take the benefit of this. Before five years the college had four faculties with Ph.D.and all those were recognized research guides for Ph.D. & M.Phil. Out of these Dr.R.S.Nikam & Dr.B.B.Ekshinge got retired. At present the college have 2 recognized Ph.D. guides and 9 out of 10 have completed their M.Phil. Total 16 Scholars are registered for Ph.D. Dr.A.B.Suryawanshi is also a recognized Ph.D. guide of YCMOU, Nashik and Tilak Maharashtra Vidyapeet Pune. During 2006-07 to 2009-10 the college was running M.Phil. programs in Marathi, Commerce, English, Business Economic, Hindi, of YCMOU, Nasik. Other recognized Ph.D. guides came to our college and guided the M.Phil. students. In vacation period, there were lectures by well-known and join personalities in their fields. The college had a research atmosphere. The university itself has closed these M.Phil. courses. In all Economics, Marathi, Hindi, English, programs students have completed their M.phil. degrees from our center.

Nearly all papers are published in the reputed national, international journals with ISSN. B.Com,PGDCA and BCA students have to complete project reports as a part of curriculum. This is an introduction of research concept. In Oct. 2013 the college organized an International Conference on Interdisciplinary subjects with collaboration of Indo Global Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. Near about 700 participants attended conference and 500 research papers were presented. The college published various issues of proceedings of bearing an ISSN. On the editor board most of the members are from our faculty. All the issues of proceeding are



appreciated by the attendants. Dr. Janardhan Waghmare, MP and Ex. Vice Chancellor of RTM university, Nanded guided the conference as the chief guest. Some foreign and out of state researchers also attended the conference. The college has rich library with encyclopedias, national, international journals, e-journals. Faculty and research students are encouraged to involve in research activity. They are sanctioned leave and provided TA/DA for outside. The workloads of research guides are reduced and allotted to some research students. Faculty from outside colleges joined in our college to do Ph.D as a teacher fellow. Three teacher fellows have completed their Ph.D from our college. The college faculty completed two minor research projects and one is yet to be completed.

4. Infrastructure And Library Research

Previously the classes of our college were engaged in high school building. Due to the increase in strength and increase in curriculum the management felt that increase in infrastructure is the must. So, the management spared ample funds to enrich the infrastructure. Now the college has sufficient classrooms with light fan facilities. College has NAAC room, internet resource centers, reading class room, computer laboratories, reference facilities room, well furnished staff room, principal office, administrative office, VLC center, canteen, ladies room, 6 acres play ground & also well equipped gym, and sports equipments. The college has 110 computers, 3 reprographic facility. ICT teaching aids, LCD, OHP projectors, UPS batteries, inverters, Digital Cameras, video cameras LED, waist band amplifier, portable public Address system, MI Board, Refrigerators, water coolers, AC machine, ceramic chalk boards and dias in each class, sound system, musical instruments set, attractive notice boards and power generator, sufficient water supply for use and 24 hrs drinking water facility is available. Also for the big-gathering function, the college uses Saint Tukaram Hall, constructed by the management.

Library building, well equipped seminar and conference hall, etc. are shortages. In near future the college may take the projects of construction of these. During eleventh plan, college was in receipt of fifty lack for equipments and 5 lack for sport equipments. The college campus is under the watch of CC TV and cameras by that wastage energy of the students in nuisance is prevented and it can be diverted towards the good achievements. Girls hostel is under construction. In the past girls hostel college can give admission to limited no. of girls. In hostel the college provides accommodation facility, recreational facility, yoga center, computer facility, including internet facility, facility for medical emergencies, TV, news papers, drinking water facility and sufficient water for use.

The library has an advisory committee. The committee meet regularly at least twice in a year and discuss the matter and give suggestions regarding smooth functioning of library work, such as to fix annual budget, to discuss the problems of library and readers etc. Average number of walks in is 130, average number of books issued/returned is 40 to 60 per day, ratio of library books to students is 24:01, average number of books added last three years is 1289. The library has Reference, Reprography, Ill, Information Development and Notification, Download, Printing, etc. facilities. The library building is kept at ground floor so physically challenged



students easily access. Staff members help such students. The college has LAN facility, Licensed Softwares, 110 number -of computers, Students computer ratio is 60:01. Laptops are provided to all the fulltime permanent faculty. The college has indirect connectivity with NKNC. The college has a well designed mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities, equipments, etc. atomization of library is in progress.

5. Students Support and Progression:

For the detail information to incoming students, the college publishes its prospects giving information regarding admission rules and regulations, reservation, fee structure, different programs available, library and other facilities, examination rules and evaluation procedures.etc. EBC/OBC,SBC,NT,SC,ST, Handicapped scholarships, freeships of solapur university merit, are available. Various prizes of Solapur University and different prizes kept through the college are available. B.Com, BCA students are guided for competitive examinations and CET of MBA, MCA courses. Gym facilities, sports facility, internet facility, medical facilities are provided to the students, Through VLC no. of activities are made available not only for the college students but also for the community people. Slow learners are provided personal counseling, simplified study materials, boosting to raise the confidence. Advanced learners are motivated to get distinction to secure rank in the examination. It is a matter of pride to us to say that Shri. Jaydeep Dalavi secured first rank in B.Com degree examination in March 2012.

B.Com part-II students are encouraged to participate in the aptitude test in statistics conducted by SUSTA, Kolhapur. No. of students have been appearing for this test every year. They are prepared for it by taking extra lectures.

Book bank facility, internet facility, reading room facility are provided. Students are encouraged to attend workshops, seminars, conferences. The college has NSS unit of 100 students and NCC unit of 54 Cadets. The college has provided travelling allowances and other allowances to those who have participated in various workshops outside the campus. Many students got benefit of these from NSS and NCC units.

Lectures of the experts are arranged. Financial supports are provided for the preparation, training of students in various cultural activities and in youth festivals. The college has open university center. A student can get admission to the courses of open university while studying in regular college. Students attended the VLC classes for the preparation of MPSC,UPSC, Mr.Ramesh Gholap from our college passed UPSC examination and has been working IAS officer. Mr.Dhiraj Manjare passed MPSC and working as Nayab Tahshildar., Miss. Shridevi Chandane passed NET examination.

The college has grievance redressal cell through which grievances of students, staffs are redressed. Also the students are supported against anti-ragging and against sexual harassment., Separate committees are working for these issues. The college has registered Alumni Association and Parent –Teacher Association. Their feedbacks are very much useful for the improvement of quality of education. They always provide suggestions for us. Our college results are higher than



the university results. After getting B.Com, BCA degrees, some of them can join for M.Com, PGDCA in our institute. Some of others go outsid. Those who are doing M.Com from our college can join for M.Phil and then for Ph.D. Some of them engage themselves for preparation of competitive examinations. They can attend lectures on VLC. Institution always try to bring down the dropout rate by personal counselling, by providing hostel, scholarship, book bank facilities, Simplified study material and financial help from some staffs etc. no. of students are prepared in various sports at university, inter-zonal, state, inter-state level. TA/DA is provided for them. The college has students council and their suggestions are taken into consideration for improvement.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management :

The institute has well defined vision and mission statements. The top management includes trustee, president, vice president, secretary, executive members , LMC members, principal and faculty members.

They play very important role in framing and implementing its quality control policy. The principal is fully involved in formulation of action plans and keeps interaction with them. Principal and HOD's and various committee implement plan and policy together. Any good work by the faculty is appreciated by the authority .Various committees carry out the activity and submit the report of the work done to the principal. Student representatives are also nominated to carry out the co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Management encourages faculty to engage in research work. They are provided facilities. The faculty members are assigned different responsibility and duties in extracurricular activities. For academic matter HOD's are given full authority, Physical director, librarian, Program Officers of NSS and NCC, HOD'S conveners of different committees are also independent. The college has various committees to decentralize the administration process. College has the perspective plan for development. There is an internal organization among the principal, faculty, students, non-teaching staff. NSS,NCC organize various activities and annual special camps. These camps are beneficial for community. Management provides financial help for the improvement of educational quality. Some of the faculty members have filed case in high court regarding the reservation of principal post of the college. Due to the pending of that case of the management has to wait to appoint the full time principal. The institution collects feedbacks from the students and analyzes it. Principal provides the results of this analysis to the faculty for improvement. Faculties are encouraged to organize conferences, workshops, to procure higher qualification, to apply for minor and major research projects. Our faculty members have completed two minor research projects successfully and one is going on. They are motivated to UGC training, to present papers. Duty leaves, TA/DA are provided to them. The college follows performance appraisal system of the staff. The college employees take benefits of financial assistance through the credit society. Financial resources available through government, UGC, various fees are utilized and monitored by the top management. All purchase is done through tender system. There is a mechanism of checking, re-checking and cross checking of a/c by the accountant, O.S. and principal periodically.



Management appointed an internal auditor. The audits of all the branches are checked by CA firm Thorat and Company Pune.

The institution receives funds from state government, UGC and paying students of self financial courses, donations from the alumni, from society etc. The college has established an IQAC cell .

7. Innovation & Best Practice :

In the college campus, near about 2000 trees are planted & developed. Campus area is free of pollution. We celebrate world environment day, No vehicle day on 1st Feb. of every year on account of Jagadale Mama Jayanti. The class rooms are airy and well lighted. Computer laboratory and administrative office has got gas plant on solvent. Every year NSS and NCC students plant more trees and look after them. The college has well developed garden. The college is innovated with e-facilities, biometrics, CCTV cameras which are observing the activities of staff as well as students. Each student can have e-suvidha on his e-account. 60 computers are connected for internet. Library is partially computerized. It is updated year to year with increase in books, journals e-journals, periodicals, carrier guidance books. MPSC,UPSC guidance is made available through VLC. All staffs are provided laptops. Examination room is well equipped containing two computers, zerox machines, printers, scanners. Etc. Information regarding various scholarships are displayed on notice board. The college celebrates Teachers Day, Gurupornima, IT Days, Makar Sankrant and all Jayanties of National Heros. The college conducted “Six hours continues reading program”. Many students participated in it. Students are also participated in writing the articles for wall magazine and for college magazine. On 4th Feb. of every year many students participate in various activities conducted on account of Jayanti of Dr. Karmveer Mamasahab Jagdale, the founder of the Institution and our inspiration.

Essay, Debate, elocution , drawing, Handwriting, sport, singing, Dancing etc. competitions are organized. Faculty are fully involved for the preparation of students. Outside experts from concerning fields are invited or hired for it. On 4th Feb. there is a huge rally from the Barshi city near about 2 km. long. All the branches of the management participate in it. Our college is also participating actively. Pictured chariot is decorated with the recent issues on various problems. Students are dancing, singing,, making street plays. etc. Huge no. of people are watching these scenario. There is also a competition in inter branches of the management. Awards are given. Our college won the prizes many times. The college selected Global Warming and its effects, Suicides of farmers, reasons and remedies, disasters management, save Trees, save water. sribhrun hattya etc. as subjects on that occasion the relation between the institution and community is created. Communities are aware of vyanmukti, Sribhrun Hattya.

- At the beginning of the academic Steering Committee elaborates an academic calendar which includes planning of admission process, enrolment process, academic activities and extension activities.
- A time table is set up by the time table committee at the beginning of the year.
- Every teacher prepares a teaching action plan semester-wise for each paper.
- Demands are put by the teachers and students to purchase new books on the respective syllabi and prepare study material.

- Fulltime residential 10/7 day’s NSS camps are arranged per year. In such camps speeches of experts are arranged on various subjects.



- Through NCC discipline, national integrity and lover for nation and team work spirit is developed.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

- The teachers collect the existing level feedback from the graduates regarding learning process after the end of academic session.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- The feedback in the form of interaction discussion and suggestions are analyzed by the head of department.
- Periodical evaluation taken by NAAC Steering Committee.
- Suggestions are collected from industry, field workers etc.
- Aptitude test in statistics for B.Com – II students organized by SUSTA Kolhapur are conducted, students are encouraged to appear for it. They are prepared by taking extra lectures.
- Students are prepared for CET of MBA, MCA courses.
- Library facilities such as magazines, books, set of question papers are provided.
- Study room facility is provided for past students also.
- Advertisements are displayed in show cases.
- MPSC, UPSC coaching is made available through VLC.
- For career options the faculty provides their advice. Students are motivated.

1.4 Feedback System:

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

- Out of 10 fulltime teachers total 07 fulltime teachers (70%) of the college have played an active role in various academic committees of the university and actively participated in design of curriculum.
- However a systematic mechanism is installed in the institution to look after the affairs of the feedback process and analysis through the member of board of studies.
- Faculty member regularly attend workshops and seminars on revision of curriculum.



- The college can only forward the suggestions of its faculty to the university.

For BCA course advertisement regarding the admission is also done by the Solapur University, Solapur and admissions are given for these programmes by conducting CET and considering their merits by the University. List of selected candidates is given by the University to the College. For PGDCA course admissions are given on first come first served basis.

The process of admission is executed by the admission committee. Admission committee is formed out of faculty and office staff members. Principal is the Chairman of this committee. The College



strictly follows rules and regulations of the State Government and the University in admission process. Admission committee members are actively involved in counselling students to facilitate the admission process . For B.Com. I Insurance, Tourism and Business Mathematics are the optional subjects to each other and for B.Com. III Advanced Accountancy, Advanced Stat. , and Industrial Management are optional subjects to each other. To opt proper optional subject concerned Teachers and admission committee members counsell the students. Admission procedure of BCA course is done by the Solapur University , Solapur itself.

As our College is the only one Commerce College in Barshi tahasil so admissions are provided to maximum number of students who are needy even beyond the sanctioned capacity by taking prior permission from the University to take extra students by paying some extra fee.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

The academic activities of the College are based on academic calendar of Solapur University, Solapur. College make the planning of following activities-

- College prepares its own year wise, semester wise academic calendar proposing different activities and their probable dates.
- HOD of the concerned department distribute the syllabi of



his department among staff members of his department.

- Time-table committee prepares the time-table.
- Examination committee determines the probable dates of, receiving question papers from the staff, conducting internal examination, assessment of answer books, submission of results, displaying results on the notice board etc..
- Cultural committee arranges time slots for various activities such as youth festival preparation, teachers day, sports day, 4th February of every year on account of Dr. Mamasahab Jagdale's Jayanties preparation , competitions, rallies with pictured chariot , dance etc., organization on various speeches by different well known authorities.
- Nature of question papers, scheme of marking , passing nature are explained to the students in orientation class also class teacher explains these things in concerning class.
- Question paper setting meetings invited by the University if any are to be attended by the faculty.
- Planning of execution of syllabi is done in such a way that it is completed at least 15 days prior to the commencement of the University examination.
- In last 15 days teachers discuss and solve some personal difficulties , queries of the students if any.
- Teachers may boost the courage of some slow learner students by instructing them in simple language.
- Internal examination answer books are assessed and marks are shown to the students.
- Their grievances regarding the internal examination marks are heard and change in marks are rectified & results are displayed in the show cases.
- Good wishes are offered to the students for their better performance in the University examination by which their



confidence may increase.

- Examination conducting work as junior supervisor or internal , external senior supervisor in the College or in other College as per need is done by the faculty.
- Assessment work of University examination if invited is done by the faculty.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

IQAC works as a guide to conduct various activities in the College. It puts checking on the performance of activities and provides certain suggestions for the optimum outputs. Following are the some of the suggestions given by IQAC for effective teaching, learning and evaluation process –

- Group discussion, debates etc..

- Journals , magazines some reference books etc. are suggested.
- Books on all the religions are made available in the College library.
- Students are encouraged to write some articles for publications.
- Students are encouraged to write some literature and publish in the College magazine ,on the wallpaper.
- Books are suggested to read and write.
- Their writings are inspected and some improvements are suggested.
- Students are encouraged to prepare for competitive examinations.
- B.Com. part II students are encouraged to appear for the Business Stat. aptitude examination organized by SUSTA , Kolhapur. They are prepared for that examination by



taking extra lectures.

- Students are encouraged to attend classes on VLC.
- Students are prepared and encouraged to the participation in various competitions organized on the 4th February of every year on a/c of Karmveer Dr.Mamasaheb Jagdale Jayanti.

- Every faculty member has his email id.
- Our University is the first digital university in the Maharashtra state that's why our College is also a digital College.
- Students are getting e-suvidha on their own account which facilitates the accessibility of information about syllabus , question paper nature , examination time-table, examination hall tickets, results, job opportunities etc..
- In our College classes are with full strength. Sometimes the last bench students may not hear the voice of teachers clearly so the College has purchased and supplied Clarity pro-sound waistband to the teachers. By this , with use of his minimum energy students get voice of teachers clearly.

- For cultural programmes and annual gatherings with huge crowd, instead of using the ordinary sound system we use “one in all” sound system called “Portable Public Address System”. College has spent substantial amount to purchase this. It is handy, attractive, requires very small place and easy to operate.
 - Students can attend VLC lectures.

Jagdale's Jayanti to be celebrated on 4th February of every year. For these competitions recent topics are given. Students are felicitated and honoured with certificates, prizes etc.. Rally with pictured chariots is drawn through Barshi city. Recent themes on various subjects are taken to picture the chariot. Thousands of people watch these pictured chariots and get the message about the current events. By that way students can have interaction with society.

- Students are also encouraged to take part in cultural activities like youth festivals by which their creativity increases.
- Important books, articles and information are downloaded and used by faculty and students.
- SUSTA.

- Facilities of internet are provided.
- Students are encouraged for discussion and debates.
- Watch of CCTV cameras.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library resources are used to augment teaching-learning process by the following ways -

- Library is well equipped with books, reference books, journals, magazines, back volumes, CDs, thesis, dissertations.



- Internet facilities are provided to the students and the staff.
- Reading room facilities are provided to the students.
- Library is kept open from 9.30am to 6.00pm.
- In examination days reading room is kept open up to 11.00 p.m..
- Students, staff can use the library for projects, assignments , reference books and research.
- Library is partially computerized with LIB-MAN software and in short time it will be fully computerized.
- New arrivals in the library are displayed on the show case.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Some of our faculty members work on University bodies especially Dr. A.B. Suryawanshi was working as Dean of Commerce Faculty and member of Management Council (MC). So due to heavy workload of the University meetings, sometimes he could not engage the regular classes of institution. Also sometimes the College teachers who were on strike could not complete their curricula in regular time span, however , they get completed by engaging extra lectures on Sundays and holidays. So there was a challenge in completing the curriculum. But they took extra lectures on Sundays and holidays & completed the curriculum within time framed. University has introduced semester system from last 3 years. So there are few chances in challenging in completing the curriculum. Sometimes due to shortage of teaching and non-teaching staff this problem may arise. By appointing teachers on CHB the problem was solved.

Students and faculties are made aware of the evaluation process through the following ways –

- Prospectus.
- Well-Come programmes organized by the institution for the first year students.
- Subject teacher informs the students about the evaluation process in concerning.
- Steering Committee plans and decide tentative dates of first and second pre-semester examinations.
- Examination committee prepares the time-table and display on notice board.
- The results of internal examinations are displayed on the notice board for information of the students.
- Well in advance University examination time-tables are displayed on notice board and also it is available on university web-site.

Performance of internal examination is only for monitoring the progress of students. It is not considered for the preparation of final performance. Only the marks secured by the candidate in the University examination are considered for his/her performance.

University has introduced semester system for all the UG and PG programmes. For BCA and PGDCA programmes internal examiners take the practical examinations and marks are sent to the University. For these courses viva-voce is conducted by examiners appointed by the University. For Environmental study internal examiner assess the answer books and marks are sent to the University.

To ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and the College following steps are taken by the institute-

- The Steering Committee and examination committee intimate the implementation of evaluation reforms through notice board and by making announcement.
- Students are acquainted with the new paper style , evaluation scheme and period of examination.

- Social activities on attendance in the classes.

Summative assessment evaluate student's learning at the end of academic session which is conducted by the University. University conducts summative evaluation at the end of each semester through the following –

- Written examinations.
- Practical Examinations for BCA and PGDCA courses.
- Project work for BCA ,PGDCA and M.Com. courses.
- Viva-voce for BCA ,PGDCA, M.Com. ,M.Phil. & dissertation for M.Phil. course.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

Following are the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessments.

- The College adapts semester pattern as per the University decision.
- For B.Com. course there is no internal assessment. Even then interested teachers may give assignments , take seminars , arrange group discussions , conduct internal tests etc..
- However, for B.Com. course the College conducts pre-semester examinations, in all the subjects prior to



University semester examination. For this, question papers are drawn, answer books are assessed by the faculty. Examination committee prepares the result and it is displayed on the notice board. But there is no weightage for the internal marks in the final University examination.

- For BCA and PGDCA courses 20% of the weightage is given for the internal assessment.
- For assignment , classroom performance, seminars, group discussion 10% weightage.
- For mid-test 5% weightage.
- For behavior, regularity in the class , independent learning, communication skill and involvement in College activities etc. carrying 5% weightage.
- Internal marks are displayed on notice board.
- Answer books of mid-term test are shown to the students if he/she desires.
- If there is an error in the given marks then it is corrected.
- For BCA and PGDCA courses practical examinations are taken internally and marks are sent to the University.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The College imparts professional attributes/skills throughout the course as follows –

- The College is committed for excellence in all scholar day and intellectual activities.
- Students are taught to be independent, reflective in practice and information literate forever.

- Students are taught to be positive work attitude and have ethical moral.



- They are prepared to communicate effectively and to the self awareness.

The College ensures attainment of these attributes by conducting –

- Personality Development Workshop
- Participation of students in cultural programmes.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Following are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation -

- **At College level :** For B.Com degree course there is no internal assessment even then some interested teachers may give assignments , conduct tests, organize seminars , group discussion etc. also the College conducts pre-semester examinations for both the semesters. Answer books are assessed , Marks are shown to students , results are displayed on notice board but these marks are not considered for awarding the final grade.

But for BCA and PGDCA courses there is an internal assessment for 20% marks. It includes home assignments,



mid-tests , group discussions , behavior , participation of students in the College activities, attendance in the class as well as in the computer laboratory etc.. If any student is not satisfied with the internal marks given by the faculty he can apply to the HOD of that department and finally to the Principal. He can have reassessment and the marks will be rectified.

- **At University level :** If a student is dissatisfied with his/her result in the University examination , he/she can tender an application in the College in prescribed format within 8 days from the date of declaration of result by paying required fee for rechecking. He gets reassessments and corresponding changes in mark sheet are done by the University.
- If a student is dissatisfied with the result given by the University, he/she can demand photo copy of his/her answer book by paying necessary fee. After getting a photo copy of his/her answer book it can be shown to the concerning teacher and get his opinion about increase or decrease of marks. If there is a hope of increasing marks then he/she can apply for reassessment. The answer book is assessed by another examiner. Second examiner's marks are considered as final. If there is a large discrepancy in the marks of first examiner and second examiner then the answer book is get assessed by the third examiner. And corresponding entries are made in his/her marksheet.

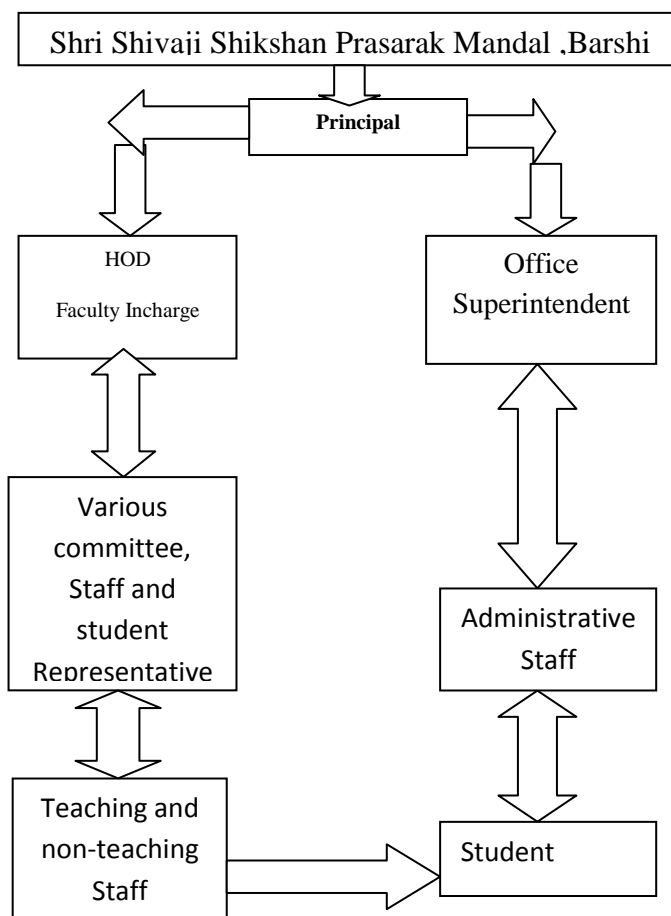

The number of colleges included under Section 2(f)/12(B) of UGC Act 1956 as on 31.3.2006 is 6014. Out of these, 5449 colleges have been declared eligible to receive central assistance, including UGC grants under Section 12(B)** of UGC Act 1956. Remaining 565 colleges are recognized under Section 2(1) of UGC Act 1956 but not yet declared fit for receiving central assistance as they do not fulfill the conditions laid down for such status.

* The UGC had notified Regulations for recognition of colleges under Section 2(f) of the UGC Act, 1956. The colleges are brought under the purview of UGC in terms of these Regulations as and when the proposals are received from the colleges for inclusion under Section 2(f) and they are found fit for inclusion as per the provisions contained in the Regulations.

** Apart from inclusion of colleges under Section 2(f), the UGC includes the Colleges under Section 12(B) of its Act in terms of Rules framed under the Act. This makes the colleges eligible for central assistance from the Government of India or any organization receiving funds from the Central Government.

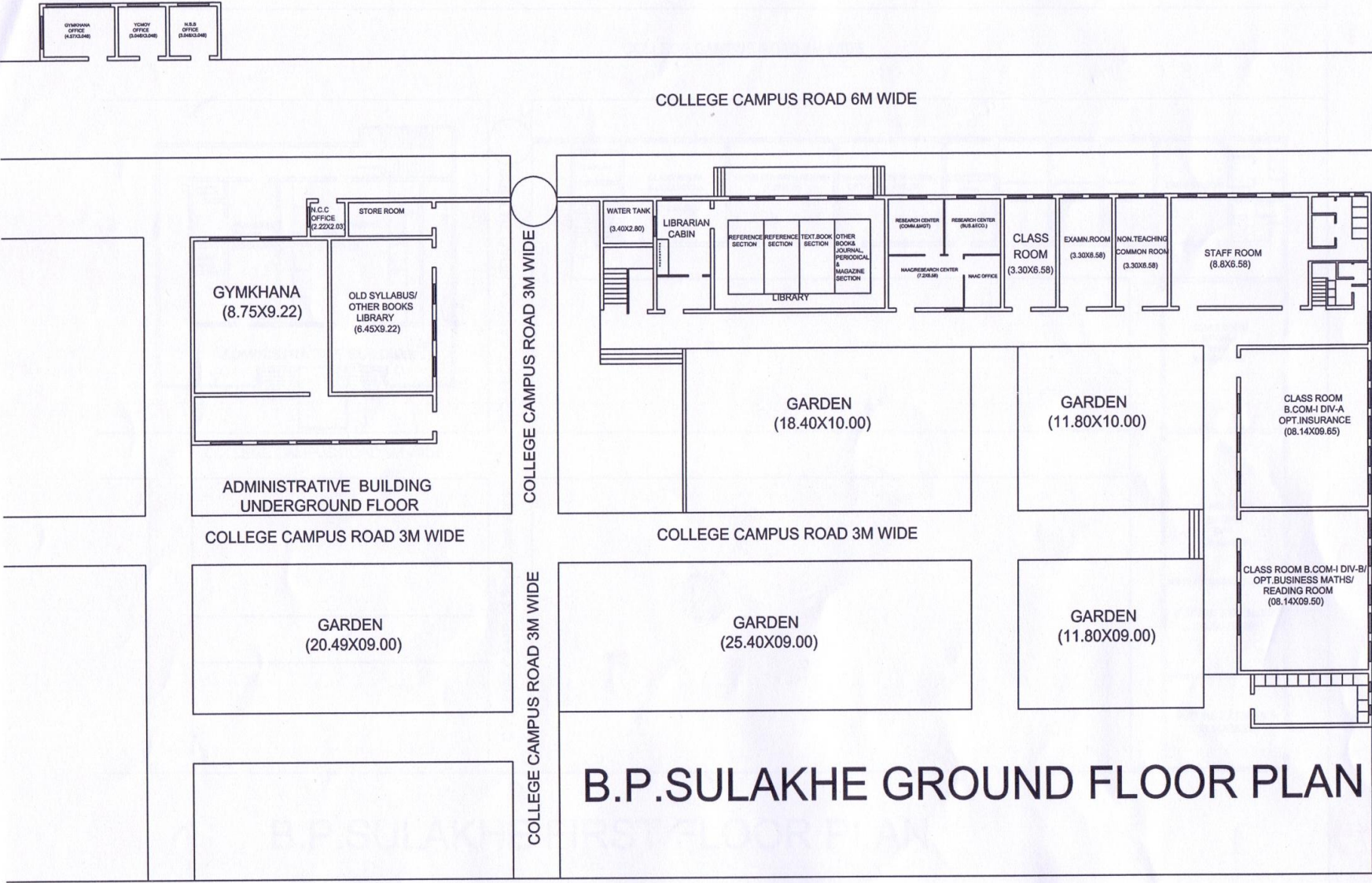

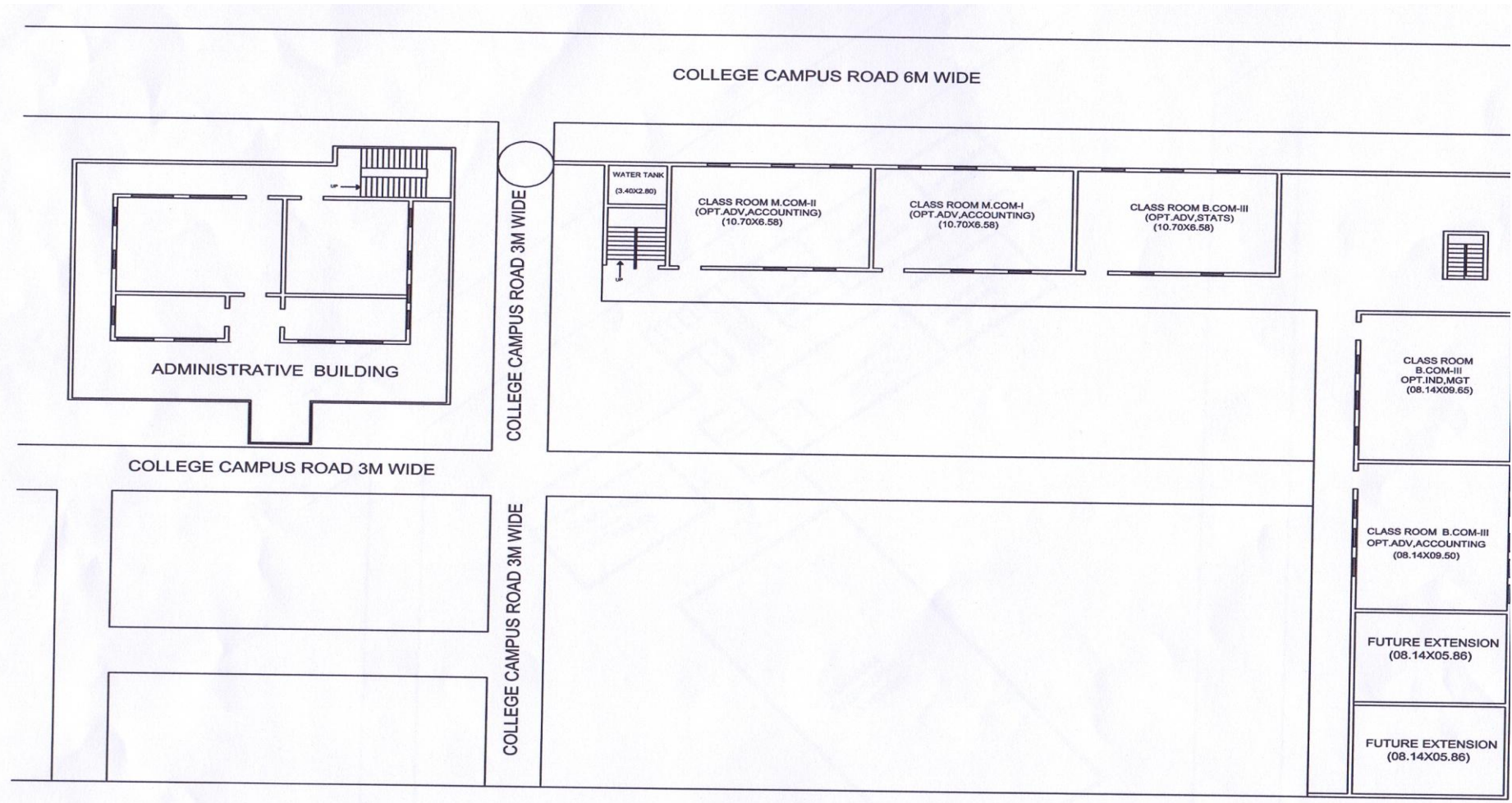

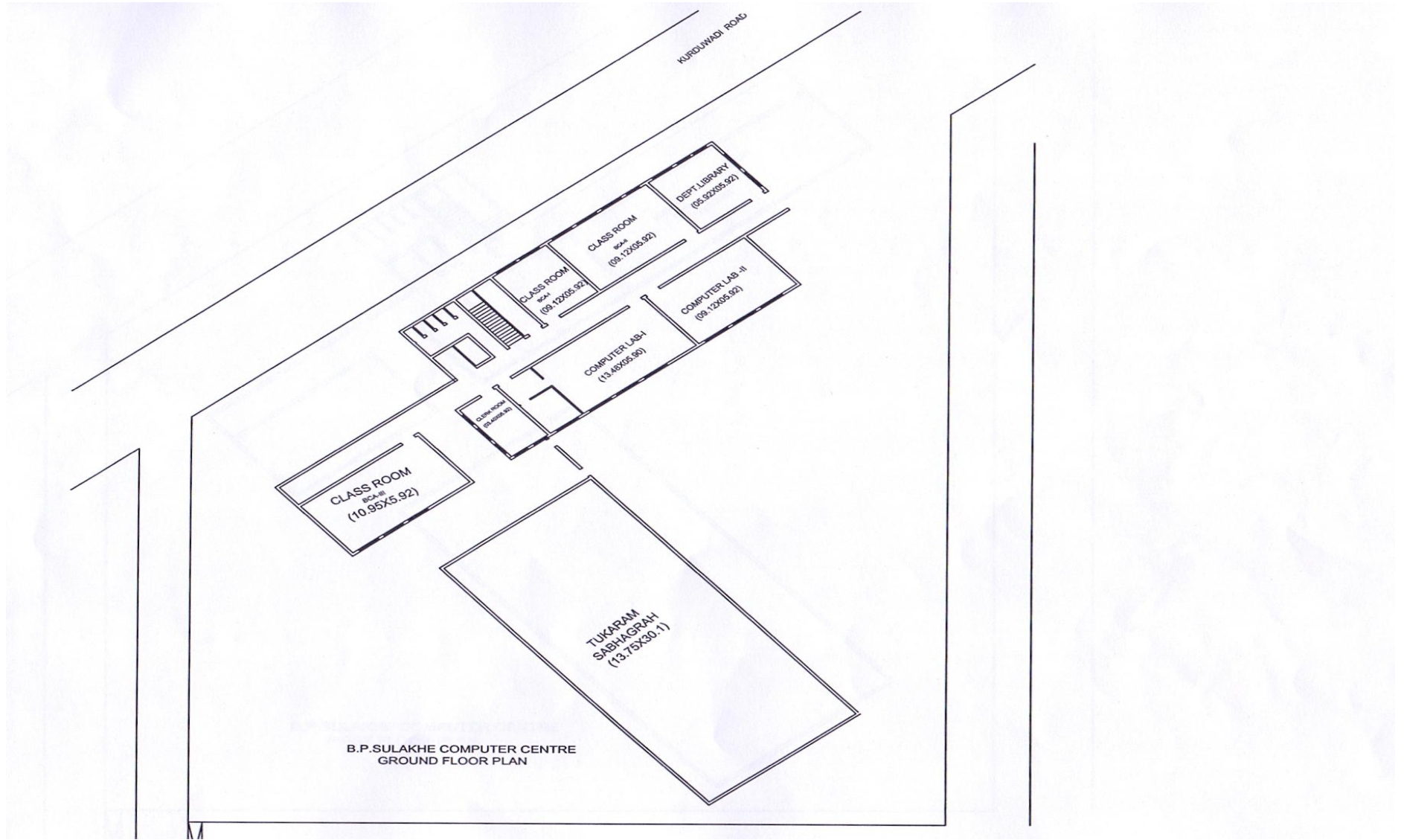


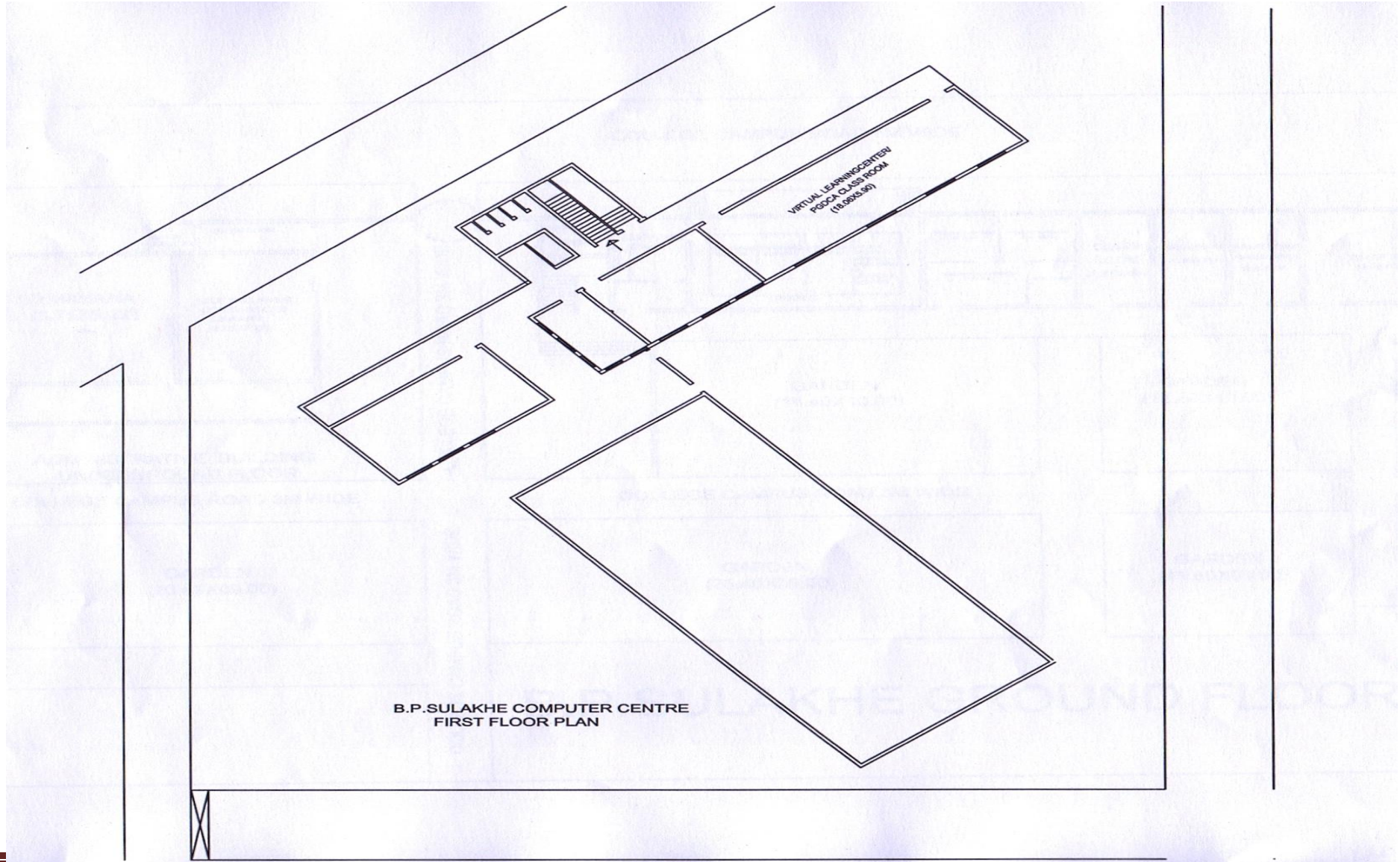


B.P.SULAKHE FIRST FLOOR PLAN



SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION

The B. P. Sulakhe Commerce College situated in Barshi, Dist.: Solapur, Maharashtra has volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) and submitted its self-study report to the NAAC in September 2003. The NAAC constituted a Peer Team consisting of Prof. Dr. V. S. Patel (Former Vice-Chancellor, Sardar Patel University, Vallabh Vidyanagar, Gujarat) as the Chairman, Prof. D. V. G. Krishna, Director, M.S.S.R.G. Kedia College of Commerce, Hyderabad, Andhra Pradesh, as Member-Coordinator and Dr. D. Jeevan Kumar, Head, Department of Political Science, Bangalore University, Bangalore, as Member to visit the college and validate the self-study report. The Peer Team visited the college during August 25 and 26, 2004.

B.P. Sulakhe Commerce College established in 1969 is one of the institution run by Shri Shivaji Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Barshi; founded by late Shri Karmveer Dr. Mamasahab Jagdale in 1934. The aim of the Mandal is to facilitate liberal and efficient primary, secondary, Higher, Technical, Vocational, Professional and Cultural education to the poor and needy. The goal of the college is to effectively impart knowledge and to develop skills by providing opportunities so as to achieve integrity, innovation and excellence. The college is Affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur and is in grant-in-aid scheme of the state government.

The college is located in a semi-urban area. It offers a wide range of courses and programmes at Under-Graduate (UG) and Post-Graduate (PG) levels. It offers B. Com., B.C.A. (and several vocational courses) and M.Com.



The college also offers PG D.C.M., diploma and eight certificate courses and are run on self-financing basis. The college is also recognized by University as study center for M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes. The institution is recognized by the University Grants Commission (UGC) under Section 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act.

The college is situated in the campus of Shivaji Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, which has 52 acres of land. The student strength in UG Programmes in the current session is 264 and 43 in PG programmes. In the self-financing courses the strength is 418. The students generally opt this college from the surrounding areas, as it is known for its academic excellence and good results. However, in the state of Maharashtra the demand for commerce education is varying from time to time and there is economic strength in all the sections. The unit cost of education of the Institution in the year 2003-2004 was Rs.9985.62 and for self-financing courses Rs.4265.25.

The college has a total strength of 17 teaching staff, of which 08 are permanent and 09 are part-time teachers. There are 12 administrative staff and 5 technical staff. The college has a good library, Computer center, Health center, Hostels for boys and girls besides Sports facilities, Gymnasium, Vehicle parking shed etc. There are adequate drinking water facility.

The Peer Team carefully perused and analyzed the self-study report of the college. It went through all the relevant documents and also interacted at length with the members of the Management and Governing Board of the college, the Principal, the members of faculty and non-teaching staff, students, parents and Alumni of the college. The Peer Team also visited the various departments and other support services. Based on these visits and meetings and as per the criteria identified by the NAAC, the assessment of the college on the basis of its strengths and concerns is as under :

SECTION 2 : CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS

Criterion I : Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur and follows the syllabi prescribed by the University. The teaching and learning is consistent with its vision and mission and the goals and objectives of the Shivaji Shikshan Prasarak Mandal.



The college offers B. Com. and B.C.A. courses at the degree level and a good number of combinations in elective subjects are also offered to students for B. Com. with Advanced Accountancy, Advanced Costing, Advanced Statistics, Industrial Management, Advanced Banking and Bachelor of Computer Application (B.C.A.) which are of three years duration courses. The college also runs Post Graduate (PG) course in M.Com. and Post-Graduate Diploma in Computer Management (D.C.M.). The college at present is running eight certificate courses related to Commerce and Information Technology on self-financing basis. The college is also a recognized center for M. Phil and Ph.D. programmes in Commerce and Management. In addition to the conventional courses the college is a recognized study center of Distance Education programme for B. A. and B. Com. Degrees of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU), Nashik.

Horizontal mobility for pursuing the courses is available as per University rules. The range of elective / core options available is quite wide. There are no non-core options. Within the framework of the curricula as prescribed by Shivaji University, the college has been developing such packages, which impart and enrich the knowledge, skills and values that help students in aiming at and achieving academic excellence. Students of the college are exposed to visits to industrial units, banks, excursions, etc., as a part of curricular activity.

The college has evolved an informal mechanism to monitor the progress of different academic programmes through various administrative/ advisory committees. These committees recommend the desired improvements in the academic programmes on the basis of general feedback received from the students and parents, as a consequence of which changes are brought in to enrich the knowledge and competency levels of the students.

The college introduced job-oriented courses on self-financing basis keeping in view, the challenges emerging in the job market. The focus is on emerging areas like E-Commerce, E-Business Administration and Information Technology.



Criterion II : Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

The college has a transparent admission procedure. The students are admitted to the college strictly on merit. The relative merit of the candidates is decided on the basis of academic records. Preference is given to Junior college students run under the same management. The college provides weightage to the students with extracurricular activities such as sports; cultural activities for admission and post-graduate students based on the academic record and reservation rules as per university norms.

The college publishes its prospectus every year, which provides the requisite information regarding the admission procedures, the courses available, the fee structure and other information relevant to seek admissions and also about the academic standing of the college.

The college staff prepares teaching plans well before the commencement of the academic session. Term plans and monthly plans are prepared in accordance with the university norms to ensure effective teaching. The syllabi are unitized according to the teaching plan through the terms / year. Classroom lectures are supplemented with question-answer sessions, seminars, workshops, debates, group discussions etc. Besides, audio-visual aids, charts, maps, etc., the college also has a variety of learner-centered teaching methods, aids, tours, wallpapers, paper reading, etc. The number of teaching days in the college during 2002-2003 were 181 and is well within the University stipulations.

The college follows the annual system of examination. For B.C.A. course, there is a semester system. D.C.M. and B.C.A. student have internal weightage of 20 percent of the total marks, which is assigned to these tests. The University annual examination carries 80 percent marks. The outline of the system of examination and evaluation followed is given to all the students through the college prospectus.

The management of the college encourages teachers to participate in seminars, workshops, and conferences for their academic enrichment. Many teachers of the college have attended orientation and refresher courses and



also participated in departmental as well as state-level seminars and workshops. Two staff members have attended International and four have attended National-level seminars / workshops while one staff member has worked as a resource person. The college has conducted few workshops.

The institution has a process of self-appraisal mechanism for the teaching faculty and the same is used as part of annual confidential appraisal. It helps to provide guidance from academic peers in bringing about relevant changes in the curriculum. There is a students' feedback system for teacher evaluation as part of the faculty improvement. The HOD / Principal also monitors the academic performance of the teachers. Four staff members of the college have received Teacher Awards from reputed organisations.

The staff are recruited as per the rules and regulations laid down by the Maharashtra Government and Shivaji University. Further, it also recruits the required number of teachers on ad hoc or part-time basis.

There is a committee named as 'Staff Academy' in the college to encourage the teachers to present papers and other academic activities. This committee needs to be systematized and strengthened as an effective forum for intellectual and related activities. The UG results in the annual examinations are about 90% and PG result is about 25%.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college has 08 permanent teachers including 03 Ph.D. degree holders and 04 M.Phil. degree holders. There are nine part-time teachers, amongst whom one is M.Phil.

As a part of research promotion, the College teachers are given study leave, T.A. and D.A. and adjustments are made in their teaching schedules. The College is a recognized Centre for M.Phil and Ph.D. research; one faculty member is recognized as Ph.D. Guide and three as M.Phil guides by the Shivaji University. The college has produced 2 Ph.D.s and 20 M.Phil.s and at present two full-time and four part-time teachers are doing research work for Ph.D. degree. Besides them, two part-time teachers are working for M. Phil degree. Many teachers have published articles, research papers, abstracts



etc. and have presented papers in various conferences and published books. A few staff members have made good contribution in research publication.

The college has two on-going Research Projects, one minor and one major research project, funded by the U.G.C. One D.C.M. student and staff produced a software and the college earned Rs.25,000 from that software as a part of consultancy activity.

The N.C.C. and N.S.S. departments look after the Extension Activities of the College. The extension activities include Social Work; Health and Hygiene awareness; Medical Camp; Adult education and Literacy; Blood Donation Camp; Environment awareness; Women's Guidance activities, AIDS awareness and problem of unemployment etc. which are organized with the active help and collaboration of GOs and NGOs. The college has organized a blood donation camp especially for women and 50 women donated their blood. The college teachers and students are encouraged to participate in the extension activities and the consultancy services are still to be instituted actively.

Criterion IV : Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Mandal has 52 acres of land and runs different schools and colleges located on the same campus. The college building provides at present adequate physical facilities and has the required resources to run various educational programmes. The college infrastructure facilities include Principal's office, Administrative office, Computer labs, library, staff room, ladies room, Secretarial practice laboratory and lecture halls. However, the building is shared for vocational courses and the Junior college. The College has its future plans for augmenting the infrastructure requirements to keep pace with academic growth.

The infrastructure is maintained through regular repairs and upkeep facilities. The existing infrastructure of the college is being utilized quite optimally. Regular classes, practicals, etc., are conducted throughout the day. B.Com classes are conducted in the morning from 7.00 a.m. to 11.00 a.m., M.Com. classes from 12.00 to 3.00 p.m., computer theory classes from 5.30 to 7.30 p.m. and practicals from 8.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. The same academic



facilities of the college are also used by PG classes of the Shri Shivaji Mahavidyalaya and by YCMOU Open University. The college has gymkhana facilities, library, computer laboratory, etc. and is available for the use of students of the sister institutions also. The common playgrounds are effectively used. The college campus is maintained, with the help of N.S.S. and N.C.C. students.

The College Library has an Advisory Committee consisting of the Principal as Chairman, Librarian as Secretary and members. The Committee meets at least twice in a year to transact library budget allocation, new purchases and reviewing the day-to-day functioning of the Library. It has a total of 20898 books and subscribes to 24 periodicals and few journals. The library also offers Books Bank facility to the eligible students. It is earnestly suggested that the Library activities be computerized as early as possible. The library has facilities for computer and audio and video cassettes. The Library is kept open on all the working days from 8.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. During 2002-2003, the library worked for 284 days.

The College has a central computer center with 25 computers, which is kept open from 8.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. during working days. The office and library have in all five computers. The computer center has developed five computer-aided learning packages. The maintenance of the computers in the college is done through trained computer staff. When needed, a private agency is called, on payment. Accessories are procured as and when necessary. The college has an Annual Maintenance Contract with an agency for computer repairs and maintenance. The management provides health facilities to the students and staff of the college through the hospital established under the same Trust.

The institution has 6 acres of common playground for various games; Kabbadi, Volleyball, Baseball, Hockey, Kho-kho, Cricket, Athletics, well-furnished gymnasium hall funded by UGC. Sports persons are provided with various incentives. Besides students are given allowances for zonal, inter-zonal, University, Inter-university and National competitions. Outstanding sports persons are awarded special prizes. Particularly in Volleyball and Kabbadi two students have won medals at the International level. Services of



professional coaches for a few games / sports may also be availed of, to bring in excellence in the field of sports and athletics.

Criterion V : Student Support and Progression

The college takes care of the progression facilities of the students from junior level to undergraduate to post-graduate studies and technical and vocational courses in the same campus with the help of the management.

The alumni of the college belongs to the fields of education, law, business, industry and in the public sector. A comprehensive profile of the alumni holding prominent positions needs to be compiled for better guidance to the current students. Several alumni of the college are holding high positions in different departments and public life. The Alumni Association of the college needs to be registered and energized, as an important component for the development of the college.

Several students have received different types of scholarships and other financial assistance. A large number of students (12) have received Government B.C. Scholarships and E.B.C. (168) Scholarships during 2002-2003. In the same year, 01 student has received a Merit Scholarship and 12 students have received other freeships.

The Head of Computer Science Dept. provides Career Guidance and Employment and Placement information. The college has a competitive examination guidance center the teachers-in-charge could also be deputed for training in this regard. The college has hostel facilities for boys and gives fee concessions to some poor students.

Criterion VI : Organization and Management

The college Managing Council (M.C.) is the apex body, consisting of a President (Chairman), Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary and Managing Committee Members elected by the general body. There is also a Local Managing Committee (LMC) as per the requirements of the Maharashtra Universities Act, 1994. The coordination and monitoring mechanism is controlled with a number of committees, which look after various functions of the college administration. Prominent among these committees are Library Committee, Student Council, Computer Management Committees, Academic



and Administrative Committee etc. The Principal functions as the coordinating and monitoring authority and the faculty members assist him in the effective functioning of the college.

The fee structure of the Government-supported courses in the college is as per the Government approval. There is no change in the tuition and other fees during last three years. During the last two years, the college financial position has improved due to increase in the demand for commerce courses. The college has an internal audit mechanism and effectively controls the financial operations as per the government norms.

The welfare programmes of the college are provided through effective schemes by the management and staff promoted cooperative credit societies. The management also provides medical assistance to students and teachers through the hospital sponsored by the management on the campus.

The college has a general grievance redressal cell through the committees, separately for the teaching and non-teaching staff. For the students, there is the Students' Welfare Committee of class representatives.

The loan facilities are available to the permanent members of the teaching and the non-teaching staff is limited to loans against each one's Provident Fund account, for some specified purposes. The Credit Cooperative Society and the Consumer Cooperative Society both are run by Shri Shivaji Shikshan Prasarak Mandal's employees, which also provide loans to the permanent staff. Emergency loan up to Rs.25,000, housing loan up to Rs.2,50,000, Insurance Scheme up to Rs.1,00,000 and funeral function aid of Rs.1000 are given. Besides, a medical loan facility (without interest) by Shri Shivaji Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Barshi, is also given.

Criterion VII: Healthy Practices

The Peer Team has identified a few unique features about the college, which have enhanced the academic ambience of the institution. They are as follows:

- The college functions in consonance with the declared goal and objective of the Society.



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- An inbuilt general procedure exists for ensuring internal quality checks in most of the administrative and academic activities, where all the staff and students are involved.
 - The college has been playing a major role in the educational upliftment of the surrounding area.
 - There is no student unrest and all the academic stakeholders are maintaining harmony.
 - A cordial atmosphere exists in the college, which reflects collective synergy and spirit of teamwork.
 - The college has a recognized research center.
 - Individual motivation is given through guidance, counselling and mentoring.
 - Feedback regarding teaching and learning process is collected from the students.
 - The parents are informed regarding the attendance and performance of the students.

SECTION 3: OVERALL ANALYSIS

The Peer Team, after going through the self-study report and on the basis of its visits to various academic and physical facilities of the Institution, finds that the college has been able to make significant progress and is satisfied with its performance. The college is functioning in accordance with the aims and objectives laid down by the Society. There is a healthy relationship between various functionaries of the college, which has contributed to a cordial environment in the institution. The Peer Team considers the following features of the college as commendable:

- Encouragement and support given by the Management to the Institution for its effective functioning.
- The effective leadership, dedication and commitment of the Principal, the teaching and non-teaching staff of the Institution has helped the growth of the institution.
- The college runs vocational and certificate courses.
- The adequate representation of the students of the college in the university Volleyball and Kabbadi teams.



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- The Alumni working at various places have the desire and commitment to develop the institution as it is situated in a rural area.
The Peer Team recommends the following suggestions to the Institution for its future growth :

- It is advised to have clear demarcation of the college premises.
- Bridge and remedial courses, on a systematic basis, should be offered to the educationally weaker students.
- The college may consider the introduction of a few relatively longer duration job-oriented self-financing courses and PG Courses.
- The college may provide the facilities for a language laboratory to develop the communication skills particularly to develop the proficiency in functional English for students belonging to weaker sections.
- The linkages with industry and other institutions of GOs and NGOs need to be further expanded for mutual benefit.
- There is a need for establishing linkages with the National / international level institutions for teaching, learning, library and / or research purposes, on priority basis.
- Students' personality development programmes may be organized periodically.
- The system of teachers' appraisal by the students may be strengthened for self-improvement.
- Coaching classes for various competitive examinations may be started.
- Hostel facility, especially for girls, may be considered, as early as possible.
- The classroom facilities may be strengthened.
- It is also advised to have a separate conference hall / auditorium with permanent audio-video facilities.
- Internet facility of the college should be made accessible to all the students and the staff.
- The annual addition of textbooks and Reference Books and journals needs be enhanced.



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- A few faculty improvement / development programmes in a year may be conducted in the college, on suitable themes of general interest of the staff.
 - Parent-Teacher Association may be launched, for effective interaction.
 - An Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) may be constituted in the college to initiate and monitor quality changes and standards in all the activities in the college.
 - Promotion of research among the teaching staff should be encouraged through provision of seed money and other financial help.
